Why Eco Church?

General Synod voted in February 2020 for the whole of the Church of England to achieve net zero carbon by 2030. The vote recognised that the global climate emergency is a crisis for God's creation and a fundamental injustice.

We at St Benedicts recognise we have a duty to respond to the Climate Crisis and are working towards making our church and its people as eco-friendly as possible.

In our newsletters we will update you with information of our progress and ideas for the changes you can make at home.

We have achieved the Bronze Eco Award and are now working towards the Silver Award. We need to, for example, buy Fair Trade products for all church group meetings, stop purchasing disposable paper/plastic cups, plates and cutlery.

How are we already responding?

We are now using paper towels and toilet rolls made from recycled paper. We are refilling our eco-friendly washing up liquid from larger containers to cut down the use of plastic.
